## **Country Summary Note**

- 1. On 31 October 2005, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Malaysia has signed and sealed the following instruments:
  - (a) <u>Instrument of Accession by Malaysia to the Convention on International Interests in Mobile Equipment;</u>
  - (b) <u>Instrument of Accession by Malaysia to the Protocol to the Convention on International Interests in Mobile Equipment on Matters Specific to Aircraft Equipment; and</u>
  - (c) <u>Instrument of Declaration by Malaysia under the Protocol to the Convention on International Interests in Mobile Equipment on Matters Specific to Aircraft Equipment;</u>

The certified true copies of the abovementioned documents are attached herewith for your reference.

- 2. On 2 November 2005, Malaysia has deposited both instruments of accession [please refer to paragraph 1(a) and (b) above] with the International Institute for the Unification of Private Law (UNIDROIT). As such, Malaysia became the 8<sup>th</sup> country to ratify the Cape Town Convention on International ("Convention"). At the same time, the Government of Malaysia has lodged the declarations under the Convention and the Aircraft Protocol [kindly refer to paragraph 1(c) above].
- 3. In order to implement the Convention and the Aircraft Protocol, a bill has been presented for debate in the Parliament. The bill was passed in the month of August 2006 and it has been named as the <u>International Interests in Mobile Equipment (Aircraft) Act 2006</u> ("the Act"). The Act was gazetted on 31 August 2009 and came into force on 19 October 2006.
